Note: Some skins are "capped," indicating they can not drop in Factory New condition, making lower float versions remarkably rare and important.

StatTrak™ and Souvenirs

In addition to use, skins can include special versions:

- **StatTrak™:** These weapons include a little digital counter that tracks the number of verified kills the owner makes with that particular weapon.
- **Keepsake Packages:** Dropped during official Valve-sponsored esports tournaments (Majors), these skins come pre-applied with gold sticker labels representing the groups and map of the particular match.

Rarity Tiers: From Consumer to Covert

Skins are classified into different rarity tiers, which determine how often they appear in weapon cases. Understanding these tiers helps players evaluate the prestige and relative value of a product.
