1. **The Steam Item Store:** Every Thursday, Facepunch releases a brand-new batch of community-created skins picked by the developers. Buying them directly from the shop ensures the base price (normally in between £ 0.99 and £ 2.99).
2. **The Steam Community Market:** Once skins have actually been purchased or dropped, players can buy and offer them easily on the Steam Market. Prices are dictated by supply and demand, meaning uncommon or popular skins can increase in value.

3. **Random In-Game Drops:** Simply playing on authorities or neighborhood servers grants random item drops over time, though these are usually lower-tier common or uncommon items.
4. **Jerk Drops:** Facepunch frequently partners with popular material developers to offer unique, time-limited skins for audiences who enjoy getting involved streams.
