Tips for a Successful Titration Journey

- **Buy a Reliable Blood Pressure Monitor:** Your prescriber will require precise weekly readings of your blood pressure and heart rate. Buy a verified upper-arm screen rather than a wrist one.
- **Manage Expectations:** Titration is rarely a straight line. You may experience a dose that makes you feel jittery, or one that seems like it not does anything at all. This is all regular information for your prescriber.
