

Dagsboro does not announce itself with the kind of noise you find in bigger coastal towns. It reveals itself more slowly, in the way a road opens onto a line of old trees, or in the way a church steeple, a storefront, and a modest home seem to settle into the same landscape without competing for attention. That quieter quality is part of the town's character, and it has helped Dagsboro keep a sense of continuity that many places lose when growth comes too fast.
