

Knoxville has a way of surprising people who think they already know Tennessee. It is not a city that puts on a polished act and calls it culture. It feels lived in, layered, and practical, with a downtown that has spent years learning how to balance history, music, sports, neighborhoods, parks, and a growing appetite for design. Then there is the quirky, family-friendly side of Knoxville's cultural identity. The Muse Knoxville and the Tennessee Theatre are reminders that culture here is not split into neat categories. Some spaces are about science and
