

If you have ever picked up a THC delta 9 product and wondered why two labels that both say “delta 9” can hit so differently, you are not imagining things. Potency is only one piece of the puzzle. Terpenes, extraction style, dose timing, your food in your stomach, and even what kind of product form you used (gummies versus vapes versus flower) all change how delta 9 shows up.

Flower and the “whole plant” effect
