Use Condition	Float Value Range	Visual Description
Factory New (FN)	0.00-- 0.07	Pristine condition with little to no scratches or fading. Usually the most pricey.
Minimal Wear (MW)	0.07-- 0.15	Really light wear, typically only noticeable upon close inspection.
Field-Tested (FEET)	0.15-- 0.38	Obvious scratches and wear on prominent edges, however the artwork stays largely intact.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.45	Significant wear, heavy scratching, and visible fading of colors.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.45-- 1.00	Incredibly used, rusted, or greatly faded. In some cases demanded for distinct "black-grind" results.

The CS: GO skin economy runs much like a real-world stock market. Prices vary based upon supply and need, esports occasions, video game updates, and community sentiment.

How Players Acquire Skins

- **Random Drops:** Players receive random weapon drops or cases just by using official or community servers.

- **The Asiimov Series:** Instantly recognizable by its futuristic, sci-fi orange-and-white visual, covering the AWP, M4A4, and P250.

- **Diversify Your Purchases:** If you are buying skins as an investment, search for products with stable need (like popular representative skins, cases, or steady weapon surfaces) instead of unpredictable high-tier

products.
