- **Esports Match Betting:** Platforms that permit users to wager their skins on the outcome of professional CS: GO and CS2 tournaments.

Valve's Crackdown and Ongoing Regulation

Valve has not remained passive while third-party markets exploited its copyright. The business has taken several aggressive actions to suppress unauthorized gambling, though the fight is far from over.

- **Cease and Desist Orders:** In 2016, Valve released official cautions to dozens of third-party gambling sites, demanding they cease operations using the Steam OpenID API.
- **Trade Restrictions:** Valve executed trade holds-- requiring users to wait numerous days before freshly traded items could be transferred again-- to disrupt the instant-liquidity design preferred by gambling operators.

- **Account Bans:** Valve routinely bans the Steam accounts of popular figures, traders, and bots associated with massive commercial gambling operations.

In spite of these procedures, the industry proved resilient. Operators rapidly discovered workarounds, such as using peer-to-peer cryptocurrency exchanges or moving to alternative peer-to-peer trading techniques that bypass standard bot accounts. In addition, governments around the world have started taking notice, with numerous European nations categorizing skin gambling as unlawful un-licensed gambling under national laws.
