Skins are classified into various rarity levels, normally identified by color. The rarer the skin, the lower the drop rate, and typically, the greater the rate.

2. Use Conditions (Float Values)

Every skin is assigned a Float Value varying from 0.00 to 1.00, which identifies its physical wear and tear. This system makes sure that no two skins look entirely identical.

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07 (Pristine, very little scratches)
- **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15 (Slight imperfections, minor wear on edges)
- **Field-Tested (FT):** 0.15-- 0.38 (Noticeable scratches and fading)
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45 (Significant wear, paint missing out on in essential locations)
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00 (Heavily deteriorated, often changing the skin's look completely)

Note: Some skins are "capped," implying they can not drop in Factory New condition, making lower float variants exceptionally unusual and valuable.

The Virtual Economy: Why Are Skins So Expensive?

To an outsider, spending hundreds-- or perhaps thousands-- of dollars on a digital knife or rifle texture sounds unreasonable. However, the CS: GO skin economy operates similar to the real-world stock exchange or art market. A number of financial principles drive these prices:



Supply and Demand

Valve controls the supply by limiting how often specific cases drop and retiring old collections. As the player base grows, the demand for classic skins increases while the offered supply remains fixed or decreases (due to prohibited accounts or non-active players), driving rates up.

Liquidity and Real-World Value

Unlike traditional video games where in-game purchases are locked to your account, CS: GO skins can be traded, offered, and transformed into genuine currency through reliable third-party platforms. This liquidity transforms skins from simple cosmetic items into speculative financial properties.

Cultural Status and Esports
