* ROI (Return on Investment) is computed as the average resale value of the <https://cs2skin.com/cases> rarest skin divided by the overall expense of the case plus key, revealed as a percentage.

- **Community trends:** Viral videos or professional gamers showcasing an unusual pull can trigger a short-term surge in interest.
- **Key prices:** Valve changes the price of secrets occasionally, straight affecting the expense of opening a case.

- **Set a budget:** Decide beforehand how much you want to spend on secrets and treat it as a recreational cost.

- **Market volatility:** Skin prices can drop drastically after a brand-new case is launched, implying a skin purchased for £ 200 might be worth £ 50 a month later.

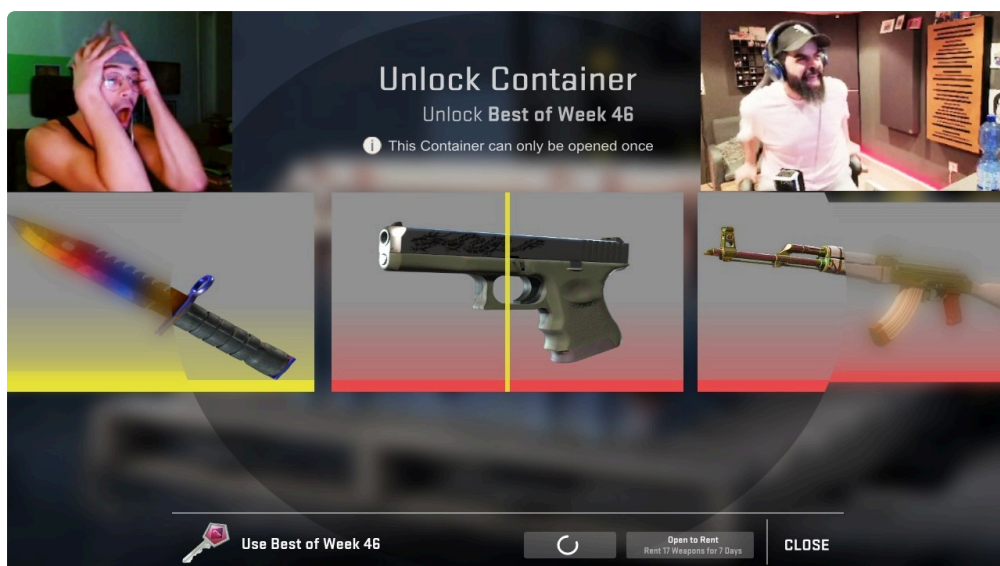
Often Asked Questions (FAQ)
