percentages above represent the "base" possibility per opening. The actual "Blue Gems" (Gold tier) are incredibly uncommon, typically estimated at less than 0.0001% for specific high-tier knives.

How the Opening Mechanic Works

When a gamer clicks "Unlock," the video game produces a random number. This number correlates to a specific product within the case's pool.

Drift Value & StatTrak

A crucial element in determining a skin's worth is its **Float Value**. This is a number between 0 and 1 that represents the wear and tear of the weapon:

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00 - 0.07
- **Very Little Wear (MW):** 0.07 - 0.15
- **Field-Tested (FT):** 0.15 - 0.38
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38 - 0.45

- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45 - 1.00

In addition, some skins come with a **StatTrak™** counter, tracking the variety of kills made with that weapon. StatTrak variations are normally more expensive than their basic counterparts.

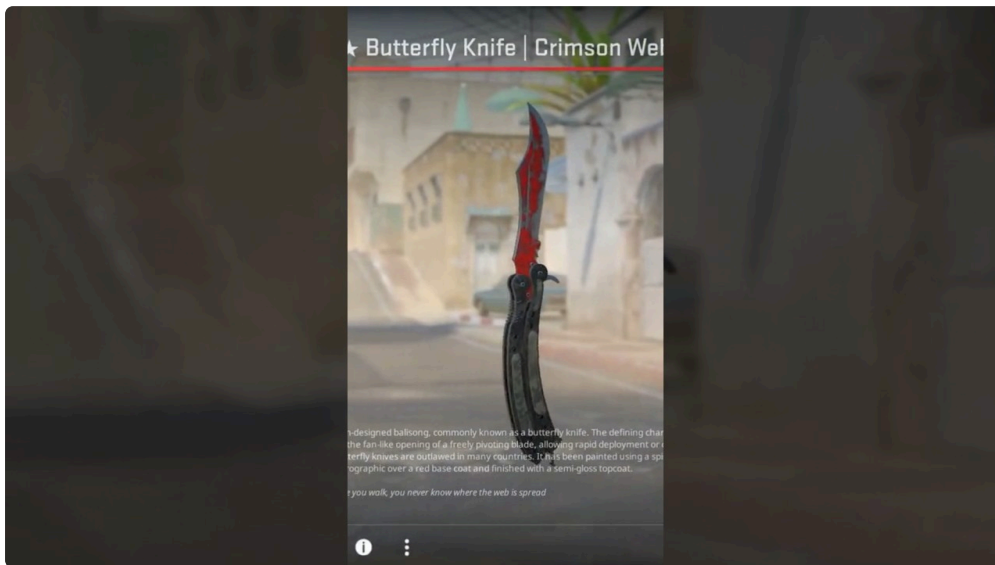
The Most Popular and Valuable Cases

Not all cases are created equivalent. Older cases, or those consisting of famous skins like the "Fade" or "Case Hardened" Blue Gems, command huge prices on the Steam Community Market.

Leading 5 Most Expensive Cases

1. **The CS: GO Weapon Case # 1:** The original case. Prices vary greatly but are normally really high due to fond memories.
2. **The eSports 2013 Case:** Contains the renowned Howl.
3. **The Revolver Case:** Contains the R8 Revolver|Fade.
4. **The Operation Wildfire Case:** Introduced the Fire Serpent collection.
5. **The Clutch Case:** Known for valuable Gamma Doppler knives.

This is the most typical question asked by brand-new gamers. Statistically, the anticipated worth of the skins you get is practically always lower than the expense of the key plus the case.

- **Average Cost to Open:** £ 3.00 (Key) + £ 0.50 (Case) = **£ 3.50**
- **Average Return:** Typically hovers around £ 0.80 to £ 1.50, meaning your home (Valve) and the market usually earnings.

Most players will receive "junk" (Consumer or Mil-Spec skins) worth pennies. Nevertheless, the excitement of the "roll" and the possibility of landing a Covert or Gold product keeps the economy alive. For financial investment purposes, purchasing the case straight is often much safer than paying for the key to open it.

1. Where can I buy cases?

You can purchase cases directly from the "Get" area in the CS: GO main menu, or you can buy them from the Steam Community Market for a variable rate.

4. Do cases vanish if not opened?

No, cases in your inventory do not end. You can keep them indefinitely.

5. Why do some cases cost more than others?

Supply and demand. Older cases are no longer come by the game, making them scarce. If they contain a preferable skin (like the R8 Fade), the price remains high due to rarity.
