Direct-to-Consumer vs Dealer Network: What Are the Tradeoffs?

This direct-to-consumer (DTC) model offers transparent pricing and DIY-friendly features. Here's what this means simply:

- **SEER2:** Measures cooling efficiency over a typical season under standardized conditions. A higher number means better efficiency—and lower electricity bills.
- **HSPF2:** Measures heating efficiency across the cold season, also standardized. Again, higher means more heating output per energy input.

Why does this matter to you? Some mini splits—especially direct-to-consumer models—still list older SEER/HSPF numbers or hand-wavy efficiency percentages. Look for explicit SEER2/HSPF2 ratings in product specs.



For example, Zone Air's systems are starting to list these updated ratings, helping buyers compare apples to apples—and not get sold on vague marketing claims.

Heating in Cold Climates: Can These Minis Get the Job Done Down to -13°F?

If you live in a colder region, confidence in your mini split's heating ability is key. Some systems are rated to provide supplemental heat down to as low as **-13°F** outdoors. Both Zone Air and MRCOOL offer models with cold climate capabilities, often citing specs for reliable heat output at those subfreezing temps.
