



A home with children and pets has a different standard for pest control. It is not enough for a treatment to be effective. It also has to fit the way real families live, with toddlers crawling along baseboards, dogs nosing under sinks, cats slipping into basements, and kids forgetting where they left a snack. In Morris County, where homes range from older colonials to newer developments near wooded lots, that balance matters every season of the year.

What safe pest control actually means in a family home

4. Repair drips, wet basement areas, and condensation problems that draw pests indoors.

A damp utility corner may seem harmless until it supports silverfish, springtails, or roach activity.
