

Millsboro does not announce itself in a hurry. That is part of its appeal. Set in western Sussex County, the town carries the easy pace of a place shaped by farming, river life, church socials, and the long memory of a community that has had to adapt without **Hose Bros Inc** losing its sense of itself. If you only pass through on the way to the beaches, Millsboro can look like a quiet inland stop with a few traffic lights and a dependable main street.
