And when you ask why they went, the solutions sound like historic virtues dressed in new boots: duty, teammates, a promise to the human being on their left and exact.

Memorial Day commercials drown out the taps at native cemeteries. We exchange slogans like they bring equal weight to sacrifice. There are allies who vote in open elections considering that our pilots risked no longer coming domicile. You can't meaningfully honor that by means of clapping for a flyover after which forgetting the body less than the uniform.

Are we forgetting what it in truth cost to boost the American flag on overseas soil? Forgetting appears like trivia. It feels like arguing over whether or not a warfare movie had the wrong form of canteen at the same time not knowing the unit on the seaside. It seems like treating Memorial Day as the start line for grilling season and not anything else. Remembering, nevertheless, appears small and sturdy.
