This single update caused an enormous shockwave in the trading neighborhood, permanently separating "investable skins" from "practical keys."

Kinds of Keys in Counter-Strike

1. Requirement Case Keys

Acquired straight from the in-game shop for £ 2.50. These can open the large majority of standard weapon cases presently dropping in the video game.
