- **Trade Hold Implementations:** To slow down the fast transfer of skins between accounts, Valve presented a seven-day trade hang on items traded from user stocks. This seriously interfered with the instant-deposit and instant-withdrawal designs that gambling sites relied upon.
- **Cease-and-Desist Letters:** Valve has legally forced prominent platform operators to shut down their operations or pivot far from using Steam-related facilities.

Regardless of these measures, operators continue to adjust by using peer-to-peer marketplaces, alternative cryptocurrencies, and offshore licensing to keep their platforms running.
