- **Basic Battle:** The most common mode. Highest total skin worth at the end wins everything.
- **Terminal (Suicide) Mode:** The exact reverse of the basic mode. The player who opens the *most affordable* total worth wins all the skins.
- **Group/Team Battles:** A 2v2 or 3v3 format where the combined skin worth of a group is compared versus the opposing group.
- **Crazy Mode:** Multipliers and unique events are activated arbitrarily, adding an aspect of disorderly luck to the outcome.

Techniques for CS: GO Case Battles

- **Bankroll Management:** Never have fun with funds needed for important real-life expenditures. Set a stringent budget for entertainment and deal with spent cash as the cost of admission rather than an investment.
- **Case Selection:** Analyze the contents of the cases in the fight. Some lobbies feature high-risk, high-reward cases with a couple of ultra-rare products, while others feature well balanced cases with more consistent, lower-tier returns.
- **Start Small:** Test the waters with low-priced lobbies before taking part in high-stakes matches. This permits players to understand the platform user interface without running the risk of significant capital.

- **Play the Math:** Remember that the house usually retains a percentage edge over the long term. Treat wins as a perk rather than an expected income source.
