1. Fixing a Sagging Door

- **Step 1:** Avoid using cooking oil or basic household grease, which draws in dust and gums up the system. Rather, use a silicone-based spray, white lithium grease, or even petroleum jelly.
- **Step 2:** Open and close the door a couple of times to work the lubricant into the hinge pin.
- **Step 3:** If the squeak persists, tap the hinge pin out utilizing a nail and a hammer, clean it tidy with a rag, coat it gently with lube, and tap it back into place.

3. Replacing Worn Weatherstripping

Drafty doors let conditioned air escape, increasing energy costs. Replacing old weatherstripping is a quick, high-impact weekend job.

- **Step 2:** Clean the door jamb completely to remove dirt and old adhesive residue.
