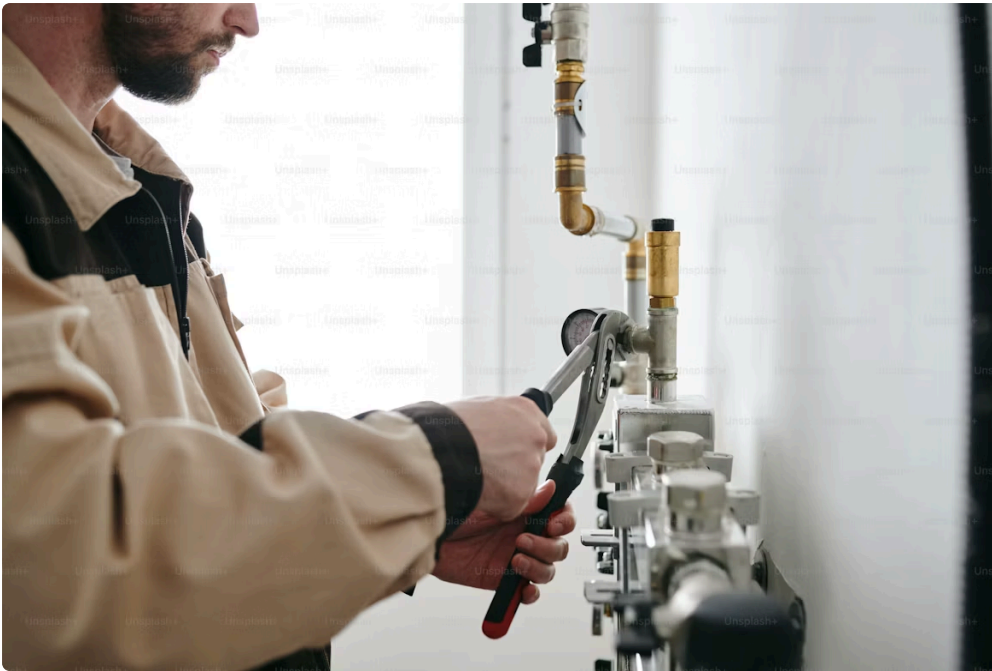

By June, humidity can sit between 70% and 85% relative humidity, forcing air conditioners in Newtown, Southampton, Willow Grove, and Blue Bell to run long cycles against both heat and moisture.

Hard water is another local factor. In parts of Bucks and Montgomery Counties, hardness can reach 10–25 GPG. GPG, or grains per gallon, measures dissolved minerals in water; higher levels accelerate water heater scaling, reduce fixture lifespan, and interfere with tankless heat exchanger performance. That is why water softeners, expansion tanks, pressure-reducing valves, and annual water heater inspection matter more here than in regions with naturally softer water.

CFM, or cubic feet per minute, is the measurement of airflow moving through an HVAC system. If CFM is too low, even a properly sized Carrier, Lennox, Trane, Bryant, or American Standard system can cool unevenly, freeze coils, or run inefficiently.

SEER2, or Seasonal Energy Efficiency Ratio 2, is the current air conditioner efficiency measurement that reflects updated testing conditions; higher SEER2 ratings generally mean lower cooling costs when equipment is properly sized and installed. AFUE, or Annual Fuel Utilization Efficiency, measures the percentage of fuel a furnace converts

into usable heat, with standard gas furnaces around 80% and high-efficiency models often reaching 95% or better. MERV rating, or Minimum Efficiency Reporting Value, measures how effectively an air filter captures airborne particles; higher MERV filters capture smaller particles but can restrict airflow if the system is not designed for them.

The International Fuel Gas Code, or IFGC, governs safe gas piping, appliance venting, combustion air, and fuel gas installation practices. NFPA 54, also known as the National Fuel Gas Code, provides safety standards for gas-fired equipment. These standards matter when replacing furnaces, boilers, tankless water heaters, gas ranges, and commercial equipment. A misapplied venting detail can become more than a comfort problem; it can become a carbon monoxide risk.

ASHRAE Standard 62.2 addresses residential ventilation and indoor air quality. ASHRAE Standard 90.1 focuses on energy efficiency in commercial buildings. For homeowners in Fort Washington, Horsham, King of Prussia, and

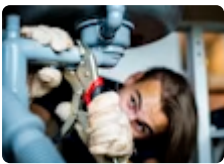
