

Elm Grove is the kind of village that rewards people who slow down long enough to notice it. On a map, it sits quietly west of Milwaukee, a smaller community surrounded by busier corridors and bigger names. On the ground, though, it has a distinct character, shaped by older homes, careful planning, village pride, and a strong sense that property upkeep matters here.
