In high-rise apartments, mechanical ventilation often supplements natural airflow. A critical note: ensure exhaust vents are not blocked by false ceilings or cabinetry voids—a classic mould magnet!

- Install exhaust fans that push air outdoors—not just recirculate.
- Avoid “short circuit” ventilation where air enters and exits the same window or vent, reducing effective circulation.
- Regularly service ventilation mechanical systems—clogged exhaust fans become mould conduits.

“But doesn’t focusing on maintenance limit design creativity?”

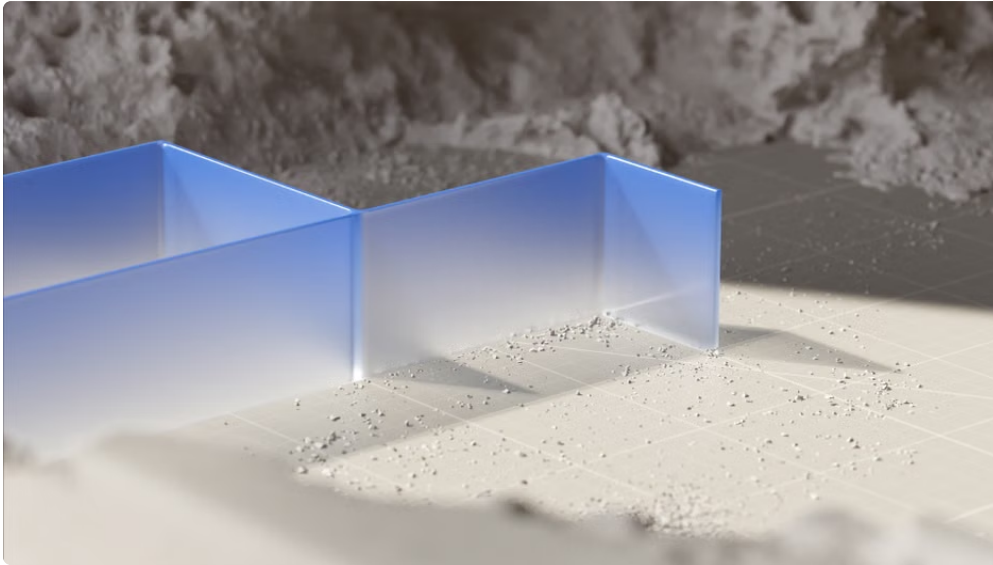
Not at all. In fact, the most admired homes marry form and function. Here are a few guiding principles:
