## Why Game Format and Round Structure Clarity Matters

Descriptions focused on explaining how a game works will detail its format and round structure clearly. This includes information such as:

- The number of stages or rounds in a play session
- What happens in each round
- How progression occurs
- How a player wins or advances

For example, an explanatory description of a bingo variant might specify:

"Each game consists of 3 rounds. In round one, 15 numbers are drawn and marked automatically on a 75-ball bingo card. Round two introduces a bonus card with additional wild spots. The final round awards prizes when a full house pattern completes."

In contrast, promotional language often skips or glosses over these details, opting instead for statements like:

"Experience non-stop excitement with fast-paced rounds and massive prize potential!"

Such claims do not inform the player about what actually happens in each round or how the gameplay unfolds — critical information for understanding the game's mechanics.

## The Role of Plain-English Terminology

Game descriptions that aim to explain prioritize clarity and use plain-English terms to communicate mechanics and rules. When browsing a digital game library like Bingoplus, pay attention to how jargon-free the description is. Are technical terms explained? Are steps laid out sequentially?

Promotional blurbs tend to pepper in buzzwords and superlatives without defining what they mean in practice. Examples include:

- "Unlock epic features with our innovative gameplay engine!"

While these phrases sound inviting, they don't give practical insight into how the game actually functions. Explanatory descriptions, by contrast, focus on:

- Clear outlines of sequences and outcomes without superlatives

## Examples of plain-English versus promotional language:

"Bonus rounds trigger when three identical symbols appear on the payline." "Unlock thrilling bonuses that will blow your mind!"

## Feature Trigger Conditions and Limitations: The Telltale Signs

One of the clearest markers that a description is explanatory is the inclusion of *trigger conditions* and *limitations* for game features. A thorough explanation will indicate exactly when and how a bonus, free spins, or special mechanic activates, along with any constraints involved.
