Field-Tested (FT)	0.15-- 0.38	Noticeable wear and scratches, but the pattern stays largely undamaged.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.45	Considerable wear, heavy scratches, and obvious fading of colors.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.45-- 1.00	Extremely used down, greatly damaged, sometimes modifying the texture considerably.

- **Mil-Spec (Blue):** 79.92%
- **Restricted (Purple):** 15.98%
- **Classified (Pink):** 3.20%
- **Covert (Red):** 0.64%
- **Special Item (Knives/ Gloves):** 0.26%
