5. **Ignition Cylinder Repair and Replacement:** Sometimes keys are lost since they broke off inside the ignition, or the ignition switch itself is broken. Locksmiths can draw out broken fragments and repair work or replace the ignition cylinder completely.
6. **Eliminate Stolen Keys:** If a key was stolen instead of just lost, a locksmith can reprogram the car's computer to clean the memory of the missing key, ensuring whoever has it can not repel with the vehicle.

before an emergency situation takes place, as duplicating an existing key is substantially less expensive than producing one from scratch after an overall loss.
