- **Jackpot:** Multiple players drop skins into a main pot. Each skin contributes to the gamer's general "ticket" weight. A random draw chooses a winner, implying gamers who deposit more have a higher statistical chance of winning the whole pot.
- **Case Opening:** Simulates the in-game case opening experience however typically with significantly better (or at least transparently mentioned) chances than the main Valve cases.
