The Five Wear Categories

To help gamers understand the physical condition of a weapon at a glimpse, Valve classified float values into 5 distinct tiers:

Condition Name	Float Value Range	Visual Description
Factory New (FN)	0.00-- 0.07	Pristine condition with little to no noticeable scratches or wear.
Minimal Wear (MW)	0.07-- 0.15	Really minor blemishes, usually only visible upon close evaluation.
Field-Tested (FT)	0.15-- 0.38	Noticeable wear, scratches, and minor paint cracking on high-friction locations.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.45	Considerable wear, fading colors, and popular scratches.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.45-- 1.00	Heavily distressed, rusted, or scraped away, typically giving the weapon a gritty, commercial look.

The CS2 Economy: Rarity Tiers

Skins are classified into different rarity tiers, which dictate their drop rates in-game or acquisition rates via weapon cases. Understanding these tiers is essential for anybody wanting to comprehend the market worth of their stock.

- **Customer Grade (White):** Common, standard weapon finishes, normally found in weekly gameplay drops.
- **Industrial Grade (Light Blue):** Slightly less common than customer grade, however still normally low-value.
- **Mil-Spec (Dark Blue):** The standard baseline for the majority of collection and case skins.
- **Limited (Purple):** Often forms the middle tier of case drops; visually striking and reasonably priced.
- **Classified (Pink):** High-tier weapons that include intricate art work and command substantial market attention.
- **Covert (Red):** The greatest basic weapon tier, including the most sought-after rifle and SMG finishes in the video game.
- **Special Item (Gold/Exotic):** The rarest tier, incorporating knives and representative gloves.

How to Acquire CS2 Skins

Gamers have multiple opportunities to acquire and broaden their digital toolboxes, ranging from casual gameplay to active market trading.



- **Weekly Care Packages:** By playing on main servers and leveling up when a week, players receive a care plan enabling them to choose a couple of free graffiti or weapon drops.
- **Opening Cases:** Players can acquire or earn weapon cases and utilize a corresponding key (acquired from the in-game store) to unlock a random skin. *Note: This functions similarly to a lottery system and relies greatly on possibility.*
- **The Steam Community Market:** The official, controlled community where gamers buy and sell skins using Steam Wallet funds.
- **Third-Party Trading Platforms:** Independent markets allow users to buy and offer skins for real-world fiat currency or cryptocurrency, typically including lower fees and more robust trading tools.

Tips for Trading and Collecting Safely

Because high-tier CS2 skins can command prices comparable to luxury cars or real estate, the neighborhood is sadly targeted by destructive stars, fraudsters, and phishers. Anyone participating in the skin economy ought to follow strict security protocols:

- **Enable Steam Guard:** Always use the Steam Guard Mobile Authenticator to secure your account versus unauthorized logins and trades.
- **Beware of API Scams:** Never log into third-party sites using your Steam credentials unless you have thoroughly confirmed their credibility. Scammers often use phony login websites to pirate user API secrets and obstruct trades.
