Case Opening	Imitates the in-game case opening experience, however often on third-party websites with custom-curated odds and higher-tier reward pools. Exceptionally variable; generally prefers your home greatly.	
Coinflip	An uncomplicated 1v1 PvP video game where 2 players wager skins of roughly equal value. A virtual coin is turned, and the winner takes the entire pot. 50/50 chances, minus a little platform commission (rake).	
Prize	Numerous players contribute skins to a	

main pot. Each skin's value identifies the player's "ticket" share. A spinner picks one winner who takes everything. Based on the total value contributed; platform takes a portion fee.

Features of Modern CSGO Casinos
