How Skins Enter the Game

Skins typically go into the Rust environment through 2 main opportunities:

1. **The Item Store:** Facepunch launches a curated batch of community-created skins every Thursday. Players can acquire these straight from the main Rust Item Store at a fixed, low rate. As soon as gotten rid of from the store, these items can only be gotten through trading or the Steam Community Market.
2. **Jerk Drops:** Periodically, Facepunch partners with popular streamers to offer special, account-bound skins for watching partnered broadcasts. These can not be bought or sold on the marketplace.

- **Radiance Factor:** Items that radiance in the dark (frequently described as "GITD" skins) are heavily demanded since they allow players to browse their bases throughout the pitch-black in-game night without switching on flashlights (which hand out position).
- **Supply and Demand Shifts:** Balance spots, updates to game graphics, and modifications in the gamer base can trigger abrupt market variations.
