

Artificial Intelligence (AI) skills are skyrocketing in demand across nearly every industry. A weekend AI course might cover how these tools work or offer a quick introduction. But do you get enough real-world experience applying these tools across business functions? Not usually.

AI Apprenticeships: Fully Funded Workplace Training in England

The apprenticeship is structured so apprentices get real-time supervised exposure to AI tools and challenges tailored to their workplace. This bridges the critical gap between theory and practice.

AI Course vs Apprenticeship: Which Builds Workplace AI Experience?

Employers emphasise practical experience above just certificates. The problem with many weekend courses is they emphasize completion rather than application.

Consider these differences:

What Will You Automate in Week 3?

In a weekend course, you may not get that far — the focus is often on foundational concepts or tool familiarisation, whereas apprenticeships expect tangible business value early on, even if it's a simple workflow automation using no-code AI tools.

By gaining hands-on experience with AI projects over months, you build confidence, technical know-how, and a track record of solving real problems.

Other Factors to Consider

- **Your current role and time:** Apprenticeships require time and employer commitment but integrate learning with real work.
- **Career goals:** If your aim is strategic AI insights applied within the business, apprenticeships are ideal versus a short technical course.
- **Funding and cost-efficiency:** Remember, if you (or your employer) pay for that £3,000 course out of pocket, consider whether those funds could be redirected to a funded apprenticeship programme.

- **Long-term recognition:** Apprenticeships come with nationally recognised qualifications that can boost career prospects.
- **Access to coaching:** Apprenticeships typically include mentoring and development plans; a weekend course rarely offers ongoing support.

Final Thoughts: Apprenticeship or Weekend AI Course?
