- **Start Small:** Play 1v1 low-tier case battles (using low-cost cases like Prisma or Danger Zone) to understand the pacing and user interface before leaping into high-stakes lobbies.
- **Keep an eye out for Site Fees:** Different platforms take a small percentage (rake) from the total pot or charge transaction costs. Check out the regards to service thoroughly.
- **Diversify Your Lobbies:** Instead of blowing your entire bankroll on one huge 4-player fight, break your funds into smaller chunks to extend your playtime and variance.

Risks and Considerations
