- **bankroll and carries the threat of striking table limits or going insolvent during a cold streak. The Reverse Martingale (Paroli): Increasing the bet after a win and resetting after a loss, capitalizing on winning streaks while decreasing direct exposure during losses.**
- **Auto-Cashout Method:** Setting a strict, established multiplier (e.g., 1.50 x) for every single round to remove psychological decision-making from the equation. High-Risk Sniping: Waiting for long streaks of low crashes, hoping that a huge multiplier is statistically "due" (a traditional manifestation of the Gambler's Fallacy). The Broader Impact on the CS:
