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Columbus has a generous canopy for a Midwestern city. Maples shade Clintonville driveways, pin oaks line Upper Arlington streets, and cottonwoods extend along the Scioto. That canopy includes duty. Start by Asking: Remove, Lower, or Retain?

Clarify the Scope: Removal, Trimming, and Stump Grinding

A complete removal generally consists of piecing out the canopy, felling or rigging the trunk in sections, and cutting the stump flush to the ground.
