2. Medium Tanks (20 to 55 Gallons)

3. Big and Giant Tanks (75 Gallons and Up)

- **Spending plan:** Larger tanks need larger heaters, more powerful filters, more substrate, and more ornamental components. Ongoing expenses (electrical energy, water conditioner, fish food) likewise scale up with tank size.
