Yet, some marketing copy may oversimplify or sensationalise volatility as predictive or deterministic, which clashes with its actual statistical nature.



Reputable platforms like MrQ balance these needs by integrating volatility labels in their UI and educational materials without overselling. They preserve exact meanings informed by industry standards, ensuring players understand that volatility categorises probability distributions rather than guarantees spins will “feel” a certain way.
