Example Cost Structure

To show the economics of a typical 10-person battle, think about a lobby that uses the "Gamma 2" case ($\approx$ £ 2.30 per case). Each individual purchases one case, so the total pot is £ 23.00. The platform takes a 5% commission (£ 1.15), leaving £ 21.85 to be dispersed as follows:

Top 5 Tips for Beginners

1. **Start Small**-- Choose low-cost cases (e.g., CS: GO Weapon Case, Operation Bravo) to acquaint yourself with the circulation without running the risk of large bankrolls.
2. **Comprehend the Drop Tables**-- Each case has a known possibility circulation. Knowing which skins are "unusual" helps set sensible expectations.
