1. **Launch CS2** and log in to your Steam account.
2. Navigate to the **Play** menu and select **Game Battles**.
3. Select a mode (Competitive, Quick Match, Deathmatch, and so on).
4. Click **Join** to go into the matchmaking line.
5. When matched, load into the map and begin.

For players seeking a more structured experience, third-party platforms such as **ESL Play**, **Faceit**, and **Challengermode** host weekly ladders and seasonal cups. These services typically require a different customer download but supply anti-cheat assurances and prize swimming pools.
