5. **Key Gets Stuck:** Once the car is shut off, the key can not be removed from the ignition cylinder.
6. **Hot Key or Cylinder:** The metal key or the ignition location feels abnormally hot to the touch after driving, showing an electrical brief.

What You *Should* Do:

1. **Put the lorry in Park (or Neutral for handbooks)** and engage the emergency brake.
