

Bayport does not announce itself the way larger Long Island communities do. It does not need to. Set along the south shore of Suffolk County, with the Great South Bay at its edge and a village-like rhythm that still feels personal, Bayport has always seemed to reward people who notice details. The weathered shingles on an older house, the neat line of historic storefronts, the way marsh light changes by late afternoon, these are the things that tell you where you are.

For a place that has remained modest in size, Bayport carries a surprising amount of history.
