1. Regulative Grey Areas and Legality

In Addition, Valve (the designer of CS) often punish gambling by banning API secrets and bot accounts, which can result in users losing access to funds stored on these platforms.

4. Financial Risk and Addiction

Due to the fact that the currency is initially deemed "virtual pixels" instead of genuine cash, gamers often fall under the trap of costs even more than intended. The digital nature of skins makes it mentally easier to place high-risk bets, possibly resulting in monetary distress.
