- **StatTrak™ Technology:** Weapons with this designation feature an integrated digital counter that tracks the number of confirmed eliminates made with that specific weapon.
- **Keepsake Status:** Items dropped during main Valve-sponsored esports competitions include gold sticker labels honoring the event, groups, and map.

Comprehending Wear Conditions (Float Values)

The physical condition of a skin is among the most important consider its pricing. Surprisingly, some skins in fact look much better or more desirable with wear (such as specific "Battle-Scarred" Laminates or Asiimovs), though

most command greater prices the closer they are to pristine condition.

Wear Condition Drift Value Range Visual Characteristics **Factory New (FN)** 0.00-- 0.07 Beautiful, flawless surface with little to no scratches or imperfections. **Very Little Wear (MW)** 0.07-- 0.15 Small wear, usually small scratching near the edges and high-friction areas. **Field-Tested (FT)** 0.15-- 0.38 Noticeable wear and tear, noticeable scratches, and small fading of colors. **Well-Worn (WW)** 0.38-- 0.45 Substantial wear, heavy scratching, and noticeable dullness in color brightness. **Battle-Scarred (BS)** 0.45-- 1.00 Severe wear, greatly faded graphics, severe scratches, and rusted elements.

- **Market Liquidity:** While popular products sell immediately, ultra-rare items may take weeks or months to find a purchaser going to pay leading dollar.
- **Security Risks:** Phishing rip-offs, API rip-offs, and destructive trade links target inventory holders continuously.
