- **Live roulette:** Similar to standard gambling establishment live roulette, but usually adjusted with 3 colors (e.g., Red, Black, and Green), where Green offers a massive payment due to lower chances.
- **Coinflip:** A timeless 1v1 game where 2 gamers wager equivalent skin worths, and a digital coin flip determines the sole winner.

- **Jackpot:** Multiple players discard skins into a common pot. A virtual wheel spins, and the individual who contributed the most has the greatest analytical opportunity of winning the entire pool, though luck can prefer low-tier contributors.
