- **Pro Player Popularity:** If a popular esports expert utilizes a particular skin during a Major tournament, need for that skin usually skyrockets over night.
- **Trade-Up Contracts:** Players can sell ten skins of the same rarity for one skin of the next higher tier, producing a constant demand for lower-tier items.
