

# Understanding Horse Feed?

**Horse feed** forms the section of a horse's daily ration that provides nutrients beyond forage. Proper equine nutrition starts with hay or pasture, then incorporates a *concentrate* only when required for calories, protein content, vitamins, and minerals. The right feed depends on life stage, workload, body condition score, and overall balanced diet goals.
