As soon as the weekly store closes, these items can no longer be purchased directly from the designer, starting their life on the secondary market.

When bought, players can trade or sell their skins on the Steam Community Market. Prices are dictated totally by supply and need:

- **High Demand, Low Supply:** Skins that look unbelievable or belong to popular creators can increase in value.
- **Low Demand, High Supply:** Over-printed or unpopular skins frequently sell for simply a couple of cents.

Some rare and discontinued skins have actually achieved legendary status, with single items trading for hundreds-- or perhaps thousands-- of dollars.

Popular Skin Categories in Rust

4. Horror and Scrap Aesthetics

Fitting squarely into the post-apocalyptic lore of *Rust*, scrap-metal skins make gear look rusty, rugged, and strongly cobbled together. They feature barbed wire, alerting tape, and risk symbols.

- **Watch Out for "Flash-in-the-Pan" Hype:** Don't FOMO-buy a skin even if a popular streamer used it as soon as. Wait for the market to stabilize.
