Tactical Advantages: Form vs. Function

1. Camouflage Sets

In a game greatly concentrated on stealth, positioning, and forest prowling, skin option matters.

- **Woodland/Forest Camo:** Sets like the *Sylvan* or *Forest Raiders* series help gamers mix into timberline and bushes.
- **Snow Camo:** Essential for tundra biomes. Wearing intense red in the snow makes a player a strolling bullseye, whereas white-themed skins offer vital concealment.

2. Night Advantages
