- **Coinflip:** A traditional 1v1 video game where 2 gamers wager comparable skin values, and a digital coin flip figures out the sole winner.

- **Jackpot:** Multiple players discard skins into a common pot. A virtual wheel spins, and the person who contributed the most has the highest statistical possibility of winning the whole swimming pool, though luck can favor low-tier factors.
