

How Ottawa's climate shapes pest activity

The **local climate** produces a clear cycle of pest pressure through the months. Long, cold winters, damp shoulder seasons, and warm summers all shape where insects and **rats and mice** move, when they reproduce, and how quickly a problem can grow.
