

Hampton Bays sits at one of those sweet spots on the East End where the pace slows down without losing its sense of purpose. It is a working hamlet, a summer destination, a boating community, and a neighborhood with enough history tucked into its streets and shoreline to reward anyone who pays attention. People often pass through Hampton Bays on their way to the beaches of the South Fork, but that misses the point. A practical visit might include a morning coffee, a slow drive to take in the neighborhoods, time near the bay or a local beach, and dinner at a place that knows how to handle a summer rush without losing quality.
