1. Check and Replace Weatherstripping

- **How to fix:** Scrape away old, broken exterior caulk. Use a bead of top-quality, paintable outside silicone-acrylic latex caulk along the frame joints, smoothing it out with a damp finger or caulking tool.

4. Adjust Door Hinges

Sagging doors typically have loose screws or a hinge that requires tension modification.

- **How to fix:** Tighten loose screws. If the holes are removed, eliminate the screw, insert a little piece of wood toothpick covered in wood glue into the hole, and re-insert the screw for a tight grip.
